Cyanotype Prints

Overview

Cyanotype is an early photographic process to produce cyan-coloured prints from objects in contact to a light sensitive paper. In this workshop you will learn how to prepare and use cyanotype paper to make prints using plants and other elements from your surroundings.

Artist Biography

Gabriela García-Luna is a photo-based multimedia artist born in Mexico City and based Treaty Six Territory, (Saskatoon). She works on photography, digital work, printmaking, drawing, video and sculpture to investigate relationships with the natural environment, mixed realities and different ways of seeing.

Her work has been exhibited nationally and internationally and it has received multiple grants and awards. It is of public and private national and international collections. García-Luna has been involved in teaching, mentoring and community projects in Mexico, Canada and India.

She holds an MFA in Studio Arts from the University of Saskatchewan and a BDes from the Autonomous Metropolitan University (UAM) in Mexico City. Her work is represented by Slate Fine Art Gallery in Regina, Saskatchewan.

Classroom Setup

-Classroom in semi dark conditions to protect light sensitive materials from light. -Tables protected with paper.

Area 1: Students dry tables – For laying plants on the Cyanotype paper with presses

Area 2: Sinks with running water– Washing prints **Area 3:** Cord with pegs – Drying paper and prints

Workshop Vocabulary

Photo

Photo comes from a Greek word that means 'light'.

Photography

Drawing with light or making an image with effects of light.

Cyan

A color between blue and green in the visible spectrum.

Cyanotype

An early way that photo's were made that makes blue images using special paper and sunlight.

Flora

The plants that come from a specific place.

Shape

The outline of someone or something. Ex: the shape of a plant.

Pre Workshop Activity

Name: Recognizing the Nature Around Us

Duration

30-50 minutes

Materials

- A natural space (could be a park) for your students to walk in
- Objects gathered in that natural space

Exercise I

Guided Walk In Nature - Essential in order to follow along with the broadcast exercise!

- Choose a place for a short walk in nature in which you can relax and enjoy the environment and where you can collect small things such as leafs plants, branches, twigs, etc.
- We will need to collect small things that that can be placed on an 8" x 10" in surface.
- Students can choose to place one single larger object or several small ones in that area.
- It is better to choose flat objects (like a leaf) over volumetric objects (like a pine cone) as they will later be placed under a manual press.

Exercise II

Recognition of Plants and Other Elements in Nature.

- As you are on the walk, ask the students the following questions:
- -What do you see around that is familiar to you? Trees, rocks, plants, branches, twigs, etc. Observe the specific forms of the different plants and leaves and choose some to collect.
- -Do you know the names of the plants you are collecting?
- -Do you know how they look in different seasons?
- -How they feel when touching them? What is their smell?
- -How do you feel when collecting and connecting with them?
- -Do any of these plants/leaves have any shapes that repeat?
- -Would you like to make art with them?

Exercise III

Preparation of Materials.

• With the gathered materials, students will create a composition to fit on a half letter size sheet of sensitized paper.

To produce Cyanotype prints we will use the following materials

- 8 x 10 light sensitive sheet
- Plants we gathered
- Press made with 8 x 10 in cardboard, 8 x 10 in transparent sheet, 4 clips
- Tray to rinse prints
- Sink with running water (or substitute)
- Hanging cord with cloth pegs

Post Workshop Activity

Name: Cyanotype Reflection

Duration

50 minutes

Materials

• Cyanotype prints made by students taped on the walls

Exercise I

Reflection/Presentation of the Student's Creations

- Hang the student's prints on a wall
- Give each student time to present their print
- Reflect on the prints using the following questions:
- -How that changed from the original yellow-like substance?
- -What are the different tones of color in the print from dark blue to white?
- -How did that happen?
- -What are the shapes that can be found in the prints?
- -Are there geometric shapes such as circles, triangles, squares?
- -Can you find repetition of shapes producing patterns?
- -Can the shapes of the original plants and elements be recognized?
- -If not what other forms and drawings are emerging in the prints?
- -What were the choices selecting plants and making the compositions and why?
- -Do these prints represent the place where you live?
